

We're Flowing!





The MoonCatcher Project optimizes girls' lives worldwide by removing barriers related to menstruation.

We help girls...

- Stay in school
- Learn reproductive health
- Marry later and have fewer children
- Fully participate in their lives and in their communities

Since 2011, we have distributed more than 100,000 MoonCatcher kits and reproductive educational materials to girls in poor communities: 27 countries in Africa. South Asia, and the Caribbean.

Anatomy of a MoonCatcher Kit

Carrier with a waterproof liner, removable, washable fleece pad, and a waist tie.

Drawstring bag holds the carrier, pads, and waterproof bag.

> Waterproof bag for used pads until washing.

Kits also include care instructions and a calendar for girls to track their cycles.
